








MESSAGE FROM CEO AND PRESIDENT

CLAE Editor's Report 2023

Contact Lens and Anterior Eye (CLAE) is owned by the BCLA and published by Elsevier and has a truly international feel to it with global readership, international authors and editorial panel members from all over the world. The Editor-in-Chief is Shehzad Naroo (UK) and there are four Associate Editors: Robin L Chalmers (USA); Pauline Cho (Hong Kong); Eric Papas (Australia); and Stephen Vincent (Australia). In 2023 one themed issue was delivered on the topic of 'Specialist Contact Lenses', with quest editors Professor Pauline Cho (China) and Dr Stephen Vincent (Australia). A themed issue is planned for 2024 and this will be a new BCLA CLEAR™ issue on the topic of presbyopia. This issue will collate all the evidence on this topic, gathered by global experts and presented in one concise issue of CLAE. In 2019 CLAE had 325 new submissions to the journal and in 2020 there were 543, this dropped to 468 in 2021. In 2022 there were 328 so it seems the numbers are more like they were pre-pandemic.

The journal is a peer reviewed journal covering all aspects of contact lens theory and clinical practice and related anterior eye topics. CLAE is an important journal in the ophthalmic field and is one of only two peer reviewed journals specialising in contact lenses that has an impact factor (ranked journals). The impact factor is an important measure for a peer reviewed journal. In July 2023 the 2022 impact factors were released, and CLAE has a value of 3.2 (CLAE is ranked 21 out of 62 ranked ophthalmic journals), placing it firmly in the 2nd guartile of ophthalmology related peer reviewed journals. Out of optometry peer reviewed journals CLAE now sits in 1st place.

The editorial board of CLAE met once in October 2022 for a face-to-face breakfast meeting at the American Academy or Optometry, in San Diego.



The meeting was well attended and strategies for taking CLAE forward were discussed. Separate discussions were held with the publishers Elsevier and the BCLA throughout the year. A virtual meeting will be held after the BCLA 2023. CLAE would like to thank the BCLA Council for their continued support of their journal and an enormous thanks to the authors and reviewers who work tirelessly putting manuscripts together for publication in CLAE.

BCLA AGM MINUTES 2023

The 2023 Annual General Meeting of the British Contact Lens Association Limited was held at 1655 hours on 10 June 2023. The meeting was held in person at the Manchester Central Convention Complex, Manchester, UK, with an electronic ballot in place to complete all voting/approval tasks.

1. Report of the Council (see 2022 Annual Report and Accounts)

All the details of the BCLA's activities in 2022 can be found in the annual reports published on the website. All members are encouraged to note the contents.

2. To approve the minutes of the Annual General Meeting held on 6 September 2022

Minutes were approved (77 votes cast; 73 in favour, 0 against, 4 abstentions). Proposer: Indie Grewal. Seconder: Sarah Farrant

3. Matters arising from the Minutes

No matters arising were proposed prior to the meeting or raised during the meeting.

To consider and receive the accounts and balance sheet of the Association for the period 1 January to 31 December 2022

Accounts were approved (77 votes cast; 70 in favour, 0 against, 7 abstentions). Proposer: Neil Retallic; Seconder: Indie Grewal.

A short overview of the Association's finances were presented by the BCLA's financial consultant, Marc Bennett. The information is all available in the reports and accounts for the BCLA.

5. To appoint JW Hinks LLP as auditors of the Association and to authorise the Council to determine their remuneration

Appointment was approved (77 votes cast; 74 in favour, 0 against, 3 abstentions). Proposer: Indie Grewal; seconder: Rakesh Kapoor.

6. BCLA Presidential election

It was announced that Sarah Farrant would become the president-elect (to serve the term 2024-2025). The presidential team for 2023-2024:

- Rakesh Kapoor president
- Sarah Farrant president-elect
- Neil Retallic immediate-past president

7. To appoint new directors

Following an election Jonathan Jackson was reelected to Council for a second term. There were no new members of council appointed at the AGM.

- 8. **To report the composition of the 2023-2024 BCLA Council** There were no changes to the council to report. The list is published in the Association's report and accounts for 2022 and the Association's website.
- 9. Honorary Life Membership/Awards

No awards were granted in 2022. An honorary life membership was granted to Andrew Yorke for his numerous contributions to the work of the BCLA as well as serving as a president.

10. **AOB**

Meeting attendees were invited to raise questions or other business.

- It was recognised that Association finances have been in decline over the past four years, Nick Atkins asked what plans there were to address this.
 - a) For some time finances have operated on a biennial model linked to the clinical conference which subsidises the national conference years between. The pandemic had proved difficult for the Association and despite best efforts the virtual conference did not secure as much engagement and support as the in person events. Much has been done to reduce expenditure to protect funds. Further income is forecast through the BCLA Asia event in 2024 and membership has performed well, bolstered by a contract with Vision Express for their staff to have BCLA membership. A strategy day was held in early 2023 to explore other ways to secure growth across the broader business activities of the Association.

- 2) Deepa Chandrasekaran asked whether only invited speakers are supported/funded for conferences or whether this applies to other presenters too.
 - a) There are different models of support provided depending on the speaking duty being delivered and whether this is by invitation. This varies from honorariums to subsidised places. Generally those that present accepted paper submissions and posters do not have financial incentives provided. Whilst it would be preferred to provide more support to all speakers, delivering the conference is expensive, however, the Association reviews what is possible for each event.
- 3) Nick Atkins asked about the use of emails for important information such as AGM business and voting/ballots – he specifically mentioned that he found recent items sent by the BCLA that were ended up in his junk/spam folder.
 - a) In the interests of timely communications and resources email has been the predominant form of communication for some time – including AGM and voting information. The BCLA reduced postage of items considerably in the past few years to reduce expenditure and environmental impact. The discussion would be taken to a council meeting to consider.
- 4) This was followed by a question on the suitability of electronic voting ahead of the AGM and whether it allows for robust discussion and debate ahead of a vote being taken. It was suggested that potentially a combination of electronic and in person voting could be undertaken.
 - a) Electronic voting (and equally virtual AGMs) were introduced during the pandemic to enable continued business of the Association. This enabled more members to participate and improved the efficiency of the voting process. It was clarified that this would only be done for standard items or non-contentious topics. Where more robust debate is required, this would be handled differently. Implementing a hybrid voting system would be complicated to manage. The discussion would be taken to council for further consideration.

- 5) Nick Rumney mentioned that a social/networking event had taken place during the conference that was hosted by a company which wasn't exhibiting at the conference. Concern was expressed that it put invited members in an awkward position and that it was not fair on the companies that had supported the event. It was recommended that an open letter be addressed to the company to address this issue. It was acknowledged that the BCLA cannot prevent this type of activity from happening but that it undermines the support other companies and risks the future of the conference, which relies on sponsorship to support.
 - a) Currently this is no policy in place to address this, however it would be taken to council for further discussion and consideration. There was agreement that this is an unhelpful activity which is unfair to all stakeholders and undermines the conference overall. Any event or campaign that the Association delivers which depends on industry support should be restricted to participation and involvement from those that have supported it.

No other further points or questions were raised.

Everyone was thanked for attending the meeting and the AGM was formally closed at 1728.
